 - *Updated reports will be provided by using Badger through Canvas.*

- 5. Ensure regular two-way, meaningful communication between family members and school staff, and to the extent practicable, in a language that family members can understand.**

- *Serve, to the extent possible, on policy advisory groups.*

- *Do my homework every day and ask for help when I need it.*
- *Be at school on time unless I am sick.*

Additional Required School Responsibilities

The McAnnulty Elementary School will:
